



Bedford on the Square Antiques, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, filled its space with American and European fine art and antiques from silver to servers.



What an elegant way to store bread! This early French panetière was offered by Sandra Rutan Antiques, Warren, Ohio, for \$1495.



Paul Haig, proprietor of Haig's of Rochester, Rochester, Michigan, stands with an 1890 Anglo-Indian miniature desk decorated with ivory inlay. Made in India for the British market in 1879, the desk was priced at \$7500.



Smalls were in abundance at the show, and the dealer space of Jane Langol Antiques, Medina, Ohio, included two full shelf units worth perusing. The 1930s Mr. Peanut doll by Schoenhut Toy Company was \$245, ice fishing decoys including a brown and white spotted example by Wisconsin fisherman Dennis Warner were \$175, and a Maine eider decoy from the 1930s with black and white overpaint was \$550.



DoveTail Antiques, Williamsburg, Virginia, specializes in antique clocks and pocket watches. The tallest clock on the table was an 1840s American ogee mantel clock made by Gilbert Clock Company, Winsted, Connecticut. Having a mahogany case and a reverse-painted tablet of the lion and the lamb, this clock was priced at \$1295.
